ALL ABOUT SKIN CANCER

As warmer days move in and we start to spend more time outside, remember to keep your skin safe! This includes people of color as well! There are different types of <u>skin cancer</u>, basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma, melanoma, merkel, lymphoma of the skin, kaposi sarcoma.

Call your doctor if you notice any of the following:

- Any new spots or a spot that doesn't look like others on your body
- Any sore that doesn't heal
- Redness or new swelling beyond the border of a mole
- Color that spreads from the border of a spot into surrounding skin
- Itching, pain, or tenderness in an area that doesn't go away or goes away then comes back
- Changes in the surface of a mole: oozing, scaliness, bleeding, or the appearance of a lump or bump

Keep these <u>prevention tips</u> in mind from the American Cancer Society:

• Wear sunscreen with an SPF of at least 30

• Cover up, using a hat, sunglasses, and clothing that covers your skin (preferably sun-protective clothes with a UV rating of at least 15)

• Seek shade when possible, especially during the hours of 10am-4pm, when UV rays are most intense
